President's Report

2019 was a fantastic year in many respects for Volleyball in our region. A number of our competitions grew, we had increased coach participation and school volleyball participation was a record.

Our Good Neighbour tournament was a huge success – occupying 4 full venues and seeing a large number of travelling teams. I visited various venues and was very impressed to hear of the enjoyment of the participants and spectators alike.

Our local competition, particularly in our recreational leagues continues to be very strong. During the year we saw the emergence of some capable groups of volleyballers at schools and clubs and we saw that reflected in the high level of competition standards. Our high school beach days have gone on to even greater growth. We are now setting up grass courts in parallel as overflow. We will consider other styles of competition to better accommodate this fantastic participation growth. In particular I note the ongoing commitment from board member Graeme Budd to this. Similarly, for our primary school events, with excellent leadership from Rachel Uren and support from various clubs we saw a great view of our future.

Our Canberra Heat teams continued their success. Our Men finished second after playing one of their best matches for the season and our Women finished fourth after beating a very skilled opposition. We had a full contingent of junior indoor players attend our local hosted nationals and some great success with our junior beach representatives as well.

Also, I note the number of new coaches we have – very pleasing to see and we will be working to improve our support and development of this group.

Our beach facility at Lyneham continued to be a source of great success for us. We were able to have our lighting repaired with the generous patronage of Steve Lugge and Drew Desmond. We also sought and received approval and funding for the ablution block installations. We have met some hurdles during our installation phase, but are working to ensure we are creating a safe and sustainable environment for all of our beach patrons. We have replenished and "turned over" the sand on the beach courts, initially disturbing some sand dust and that settled as expected. It was pleasing also to see an army of volunteers attend the Lyneham Beach Facility for a clean and tidy working bee in October.

Our financial plan is still in place, having taken advantage of retiring our debt and focusing on growth of numbers and participation rates. This level of growth always brings new challenges and we worked hard to identify and rectify where possible. Our diligent referee community and our club presidents also started work with our board and office to improve our by-laws, identifying gaps in our approach that we will work together to improve. This is a natural part of our growth and I was impressed to see how all involved brought pragmatic points of view.

Our board has re-affirmed our driving principle of "More people, doing more in volleyball, more often". Next year we aim to create a new 3-year and beyond plan to drive the outcomes for our community. We approached our local government agencies and the Minister for Sport and Recreation, Yvette Berry MLA, to highlight the restrictions on our growth that the lack of indoor facilities or access to them is presenting. In particular the battle for time in school gymnasiums for clubs to train and grow. This was met with good acknowledgement and open discussion about the work the government is doing to help free up more court space for our indoor players.

We have seen great involvement with Volleyball Australia and some fantastic esprit-de-corp with the other state associations in building and growing sustainable volleyball.

2019 saw our community recognise the long-standing and ongoing services of Dean Turner OAM with a Lifetime Membership of Volleyball ACT. Congratulations Dean for all your commitment over many years.

As I write this and likely as you read it, we are in physical isolation from our community of volleyballers. Our sport is one of bringing people together... and unfortunately that isn't currently a safe thing to do. I have often remarked of my belief that gratitude is an integral aspect of sport and may underpin much of the positive mental health aspects our team sport generates. I have personally experienced this as a player and as an administrator. I cherish the time I've spent with people through volleyball and this virus hiatus has only highlighted even more how much I value that time. To each of you, thank you for the effort you put in - playing, coaching, officiating, administering, parenting, organising (even reading President's reports)... all of these things bring us together and will continue through and beyond this current break.

Finance Report

Volleyball ACT's Financial Report for the year of 2019 was prepared by the Volleyball ACT office and partner Capital Advisory. The audit was completed by Hardwickes Partners.

Volleyball ACT trades on a calendar financial year. The 2019 operating year presented the association with unique challenges and opportunities. The key take outs of the Financial Report are summarised below

The 2019 Financial Report notes:

- For the first time in many years the Australian Junior Volleyball Championships (AJVC) were held in Canberra. This was great for our local families who all saved the travel expenses but created a decline in revenue of approximately \$150,000 as a result of not collecting these Athlete Contributions. Managing the cash flow of this change presented operating challenges.
- An increase in Grant Revenue was achieved. Active Canberra provided Volleyball ACT with a grant of \$73,000 to acquire an Ablution Block for the Lyneham Beach Facility. The block has been acquired and is being held in Hume, the project and installation will be completed pending approval from Icon Water and further work by Cardno and the plumbing contractor. Volleyball ACT will continue to work closely with the ACT Government to grow the sport and serve the community.
- Consistency in the Board and Staff of Volleyball ACT has contributed to strong financial performance in a changing environment.
- The smoke haze that blanketed Canberra in late 2019 has challenged the Association to consider policies related to Air Pollution, Member Health and refunds for postponed or cancelled competitions. This will be an area of focus for VACT in the future.
- Total Revenue has dropped by \$170k due to AJVC being held in Canberra and the Athlete Contributions not being collected.
- Gross Profit has dropped from \$140k (2018) to \$121k (2019) reflecting a drop of \$19k.

- An Operating Profit of \$17k was achieved in 2019.
- Office Expenses have increased in 2019 due to the purchase a new printer/copier from CSG Solutions.
- Legal expenses increased as professional advice was required for a debt related matter.
- The Lyneham Beach Facility depreciated \$72k in 2019. The Facility has a closing Net Book Value of \$688k.
- Volleyball ACT has a strong financial position. Underpinned by the equity in the Lyneham Beach Facility, cash in the bank and a small residual loan with large redraw function the association is well placed for the opportunities and challenges of the future.
- Chasing debtors is an ongoing challenge for the VACT office that takes valuable resources away from our core business.
 We urge all members to respect the VACT payment terms. If experiencing hardship please contact us for flexible terms.

We have a diverse and changing business model. Despite the financial implications of AJVC hosting and the impact that smoke had on the Summer Beach Competitions we are pleased that we can absorb difficulty and change.

The Player Support Committee was active again providing subsidies to our junior representative players and their families.

Again, Volleyball ACT, Canberra Heat and the Lyneham Beach Facility have been well supported by the ACT Government with important grants that are critical to our business.

Volleyball ACT closed the 2019 calendar year with cash position of \$140k and a net asset position of \$835k.

Volleyball ACT has been represented exceptionally at the benchmark events for our sport by players, referees, and coaches. Our ACT delegations are growing year on year for Australian Junior Volleyball Championships (AJVC) and Australian Junior Beach Volleyball Championships (AJBVC). This is testament to the passion that exists within our community to develop, learn, and represent the ACT. I thank our community of players, families, coaches, and referees who make it all happen.

Our biggest ever delegation performed admirably at both AJVC and AJBVC with notable growth in the Women's Program - very encouraging for the future of our sport. We are fortunate to have a depth of great coaches who led the development and performance of our teams, I thank them for sharing their expertise and passion with our juniors.

In November we welcomed volleyballers from far and wide for the 54th Good Neighbour Volleyball Tournament with 131 teams taking part in the annual event which was one of the biggest to date.

Led by Coaches Les Young and Sue Jenkins, our Canberra Heat represented us very well in the Australian Volleyball League (AVL) Super League and Open Championships. The Heat Men claimed the Silver medal after a strong season and our Women went down in the Bronze medal match after another season of growth. It was a pleasure to award Dean Turner OAM VACT Life Membership. I am sure everyone in our community knows Dean and the incredible contribution he has made and continues to make to Volleyball at many levels. Congratulations again and thank you Dean.

The Board of Volleyball ACT has led the association strongly throughout the year. I thank all our Board Members for the time, effort, and commitment they give to Volleyball in our community. Thank you to Christine Gates and Victor Amsteins - both work extremely hard for our community and while their work is not always seen I am consistently amazed by their dedication.

I must also thank the team at Active Canberra for their support of Volleyball ACT operations, projects, and teams. The grant support received from Active Canberra underpins our business, Canberra Heat, and the Lyneham Beach Facility.

Finally, I reserve a special thanks to our Club Presidents and their Committees for the tireless effort and passion they bring to our sport. I cannot thank you enough for everything you do for Volleyball in the ACT.





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2019 Progressing in steps

2019 may become known for transition with our officials. Several of our stalwart members who carried officiating in Canberra through tough times, took a break to focus on other life responsibilities. I will take this opportunity to thank them for their commitment; wish them a peaceful time with success in their family and finally say we look forward to seeing them around the court in the future.

Our cohort of referees is currently split between a small group of senior officials and an expanding group of younger officials. Whilst this is contributing to a greater band of officials to manage the local competitions, when it comes to National responsibilities our officials are within the playing ages and therefore unavailable. This will continue to be an issue for the association in the short term, but not unexpected as the rebuilding process is only two years in.

Eighty percent of matches were covered by appointed officials for Open and Recreational Leagues. These Leagues continue to provide a strong learning environment to our younger and less experienced officials. I wish to again thank the teams from these divisions of competition for their continued supportive nature, providing constructive feedback to VACT officials so that ongoing improvements to service levels are delivered to the competitions.

Mr Peter McCurdy was a very active member for VACT, representing the ACT volleyball community with enthusiasm and distinction. His activities and achievements over the last year included: AJVC and AVL representing VACT with honours, being awarded medal matches and ultimately, he was unfortunate to miss the cut as the last referee left off the list for AVL finals. Locally Peter focussed on refereeing undertaking roles as referee across both CVL Men's and Women's competitions; whilst also taking on the roles of second referee and scorer, with a focus on developing his personal attributes but also supporting newer referees to acclimatise and perform to a required level at CVL. These efforts were also repeated across the Open and Recreational competitions.

Peter volunteered for various international events Invictus Games, FIVB World Beach Tour, Arafura Games and FIVB Volleyball Nations League. At these events he represented the ACT volleyball community with skill and honour, learning about the variations of our sport; Para-Volley, Indoor Volleyball and Beach Volleyball. Peter clearly demonstrating the many options and pathways available to VACT officials.

2020 will begin with expanding the group of coordinators, this will balance out workloads as we seek to improve our service delivery to the volleyball community. Our existing young group will be an area of focus as we strive to move them into higher order skills, improving the quality of the game being played in Canberra. A key expectation for 2020 will be to provide a "Referee Manager" to VACT competitions, providing all our participants with a point of contact at the competition venue; allowing them to seek clarification or provide areas of concern.

Capital Volleyball League

In 2019, 21 teams contested the Capital Volleyball League (CVL). Through the season teams consistently pushed each other and improved week by week, raising the level of the competition yet again.

The Women's competition, the Volleyball Australia's Centre of Excellence (CoE) team debuted in the Premier division increasing the diversity of the competition and seeing fierce battles between all teams. The CoE eventually proved too strong on grand final day defeating an ever consistent Belconnen for the gold medal. In Division 1, Belconnen's consistency was rewarded with Belconnen Black taking out the honours.

In the Men's competitions, 2019 was an all Belconnen affair with the Premier team trouncing the CoE men, and Belconnen Gold being crowned as champions over Dragons in Division 1. As final reward for an impressive season across both genders, Belconnen were declared winners of the 2019 Club Championship trophy.

Open League

As in past years, Open League saw teams from various backgrounds participate including VACT affiliated clubs, schools, the Australian Defence Force Academy (ADFA) and independent teams who returned for another year of competition at the Lyneham Hockey Centre.

A change in funding allocated to sports within ADFA and some schools lead to a reduction in the number of teams that contested the Open Leagues in 2019. We are hopeful of seeing an increase in numbers in the future and will maintain our links with these organisations.

The Junior Women's division did not run in the Spring competition due to the graduation of several teams to the Women's B division. Their rapid skill development during the Autumn competition meant they needed to be challenged by playing in a higher grade – a success for the division as player development is its' main objective. The division will run again in Autumn 2020.

Recreational League

2019 Recreational Leagues participation numbers remained largely stable with the exception of the decrease in ADFA teams as in the Open League competitions mentioned above. The majority of teams returned to participate and we look forward to welcoming them again in 2020.

Beach League

The popularity of beach volleyball continued this season with numbers again increasing from seasons past. In terms of overall growth, total entry numbers were up another 20% in 2018/19 when compared to season 2017/18 across three nights each week at the Lyneham Beach Sports Facility.

The pairs competition saw unprecedented growth with an increase of 56% from the previous season. Four divisions were contested (Premier Men, Premier Women, Open Men and Open Women) with the Open Women's division being split into three pools to accommodate the influx of female players wishing to play the pairs format. What is exceptionally pleasing is that many of the players in the Open Women's division were athletes from the 2018 AJVC ACT women's teams. It is fantastic to see these young players continuing their development on the sand complimenting their knowledge of the indoor game.

The Tuesday Fours competition remained strong. Three separate divisions were run for the first time in the competition's history. This was extremely encouraging with beach volleyball continuing to cement its' place on the ACT volleyball landscape.

Thursday Six on the Beach also maintained steady participant numbers with many teams from the inaugural season returning to play again. Many teams are now choosing to transition from the indoor Rec leagues to the beach competition which augers well for the future of beach volleyball in the Territory.

Events Overview

Good Neighbour Volleyball Tournament 23-24 November 2019

The 54th Good Neighbour Volleyball Tournament was held on 23 and 24 November 2019 across 4 venues (AIS, Lyneham Hockey Centre, National Netball Centre, and Australian National University), with 131 teams competing across 14 divisions.

For another year Good Neighbour retained its' title as Australia's largest and longest running club volleyball tournament and continued to be a highlight of the Australian volleyball calendar. Continuing to raise the standard and quality of the tournament remains a key focus and depending on venue availability we hope to continue building team numbers in future years, particularly from overseas.

2019 was the 54th successive year of the tournament, and the second consecutive year of record entry numbers for the tournament with the previous record of 129 entries in 2018 being eclipsed by the 2019 total of 131. The tournament continues to go from strength to strength with its' significance being recognised both domestically and internationally, with 2019 entrants travelling from as far as Papua New Guinea and the participation of the Australian Women's national team, the Volleyroos. The future of this Volleyball ACT flagship event remains bright and the 55th version of the tournament will be sure to be another memorable event for all who take part.

ACT Open Beach Volleyball Tournament 30-31 March 2019

The ACT Open Beach Volleyball Tournament took place at the Lyneham Beach Sports Facility on 30 and 31 March 2019. Affiliated with the greater Australian Beach Volleyball Tour, 44 teams in three divisions contested the tournament and included pairs teams from the ACT, Victoria, Queensland, NSW and the Volleyball Australia Centre of Excellence (CoE). Teams in Division 1 Men's and Women's categories played off for a prize pool of \$4000 with winners being:

This was the first year that the event was run in its' current format and so, whilst being considered a success, there are still improvements that can be made to lift the quality of this event even higher and to build for future tournaments. Thanks to Referee Delegate/ draw master Darren Grimsey who assisted greatly to ensure the Open's success. Further to this thank you to the coaches and athletes from the CoE – without their efforts in the court preparation process it would not have been possible to deliver an event of this magnitude.

There is so much potential in an event like this – the level of support for this essentially "new" tournament from players nationally was both pleasing and unexpected. The best is yet to come for the ACT Beach Open!

Presentation Events

Due to venue unavailability, two separate presentation events were held on 18 October 2019.

A presentation lunch for Australian Junior Volleyball Championships and Australian Beach Volleyball Championships teams acknowledged the success of our junior players and included awarding MVP and Coach's awards for each team and the announcement of the Female and Male Junior Player the Year awards.

The Capital Volleyball League presentation dinner celebrated the success of teams who contested the 2019 CVL season and included the announcement of the Coach and Referee of the Year awards, and the presentation of CVL medals for each division of the competition.

We trained as a squad until final selections were made before the AJVC tournament. This allowed us to develop and establish consistent expectations for all athletes regardless of what team individual athletes were to be selected into for AJVC.

Our priorities for the preparation for AJVC was to develop athletes' skill sets to enable them to compete not just participate at AJVC, explicitly teach and implement the concepts of growth mindset in a volleyball context and to provide all athletes with a positive experience being a part of a state volleyball team. The girls were highly receptive to our expectations and they showed ownership and initiative to develop their expectations of each other and their coaches. Together we were able to construct an environment based upon respectful relationships and common understandings of expectations that allowed each athlete to grow as volleyball players, have confidence to take risks and learn and to compete in every match at AJVC.

We went to NSW State Cup still as a squad but had two set teams for the day. This allowed us to see player combinations and team dynamic before making final team selections and furthermore, was an opportunity for the athletes to put into practice what they had been working on and to take away future focus areas of their game. Both teams experienced winning and losing during the day. I feel it would be so valuable if there could be more opportunities during the AJVC preparation time for more match play with teams not based in the ACT.

As AJVC approached, we joined with the Under 19 Women's team to have match play during trainings. This was beneficial as it gave the girls opportunity to engage in more game like environments prior to competing at AJVC. AVL Canberra Heat Men

Canberra Heat Men began life as the Canberra Cobras in 1998, then renamed to Canberra Chiefs in 1999 before becoming the Canberra Heat in 2002. The club began with solid performances on the back of a solid, national team heavy, playing roster; however, in the mid to late 2000's, Heat Men were unable to sustain medal results. In 2009, the Canberra Heat Volleyball Academy was formed with immediate impact; a Bronze medal in 2010 with the youngest team in the league, and then taking the championship in 2011.

Since 2013, Canberra Heat has always medalled; including the championship in 2015. 2019 was no exception; narrowly missing out on the gold in a hard fought, five set, nail biter.

This sustained performance has been maintained despite some regular roster changes as players move in and out of international professional contracts and prioritise other life events; however, the culture of the club remains true and continues to provide the foundation for success.

With a late confirmation of the league format, and with many key players involved with various national team duties (playing and coaching staff), the pre-season was not as well structured as normal. Notwithstanding, the team came together and secured the first away round against the Perth Steel, and used the main season, and Good Neighbour (securing the Gold), to continue to build.

Prior to the AVL finals, Heat fielded a Division 1 team in the VA AVL Volleyball Championship. This was a great experience for Heat's developing player base and a testimony of the depth able to be developed even within a small 'state' on the back of a good, inclusive, culture and the dedication of a broad range of volunteer coaches and support staff; as well as the support from Volleyball ACT staff and board.

AVL Canberra Heat Women

The 2018 Bronze medal campaign had an overwhelmingly positive impact, with unprecedented numbers (50) attending trials this season and the renewed self-belief of the Super League team - both fantastic to see! The Super League and Open Championship teams each made great gains over the course of their campaigns yet experienced quite different seasons and acquired very different insights and learnings. A very productive season for all, with a Bronze medal for the Open Championship team a wonderful highlight.

A change in the AVL format this season saw the major competition, AVL Super League, revert to a pseudo home and away series (plus finals) involving 6 teams, with only one team permitted per State. This ensured a high quality competition that was conducted over a compact 5-week season. Heat travelled to Perth, and then played 3 home rounds (Vic, SA & NSW) before travelling to Brisbane and after a two week break to the Gold Coast for the finals.

We had a formidable team, looking to back up last season's success with another podium finish. Vollevroos Danusia Sipa Borgeaud and Jenny Tait joined a core group of returning players from last season and this experience was complimented with youth, with the inclusion of 4 players training at the VA Centre of Excellence. The team gelled well, trained hard and took a lot of confidence into the season. Heat's general level of play far exceeded that of last season yet we finished the round games in 4th position, defeating WA and UTSSU, splitting matches with Adelaide Storm and defeated by Melbourne Vipers and QLD Pirates. Despite our ranking, we were confident we had the game to defeat top placed QLD Pirates in the semi-final, having only narrowly lost a tough 5 set match in the last of the round games. Unfortunately, we were not able to produce our best volleyball at the critical times and after a promising first set, lost in 4. In the Bronze medal match against Adelaide Storm, Heat played some inspired volleyball to lead 2-1 but couldn't close it out, going down in 5 sets. This was a particularly difficult loss for us. Insights gained will however strengthen the resolve for next year's assault.

An additional squad of 20 players was also selected for the Australian Open Volleyball Championships, a 3-day tournament played immediately prior to the Super League finals. It was extremely beneficial to have had this squad training for an extended period as it provided great development opportunities for many of Heat's younger players. Improvement was rapid as they trained with older, more experienced players and alongside the Super League team.

The team selected for the Open Championships was well balanced; 5 players having played AVL in previous years blended with 9 talented juniors. The primary focus was development and affording the experience of playing representative volleyball at a senior level. The Open Championships provided a positive learning environment for our players, who all enjoyed a healthy amount of court time. Our level of play fluctuated but the experience gained across the 5 matches was invaluable. Heat had wins over QLD Pirates Black and the Tasmanian Echidnas and tight tussles against QLD Pirates Maroon, Sydney Amazons and UTSSU. The last matches of round robin play, in what was a very even competition, decided final standings. Heat were elated, and a little surprised, to have finished third, securing the Bronze medal.

It was a mammoth season for the coaches. coaching both teams in tandem. Special thanks to Jenny Budd for her tireless efforts in both roles, Assistant Coach with Super League and Head Coach of the Open Championship team. Thanks also to Maddie Clayden for taking on additional responsibilities when resources were stretched during the finals/Open Championships. I commend all the players for their commitment throughout the season, their appetite to keep pushing each other to new heights and the support they provided to one another. Thanks also to VACT staff Adam Castle and Christine Gates for their continued support and picking up many of the administrative pieces (along with Les Young) throughout the campaign. Canberra Heat also acknowledges and greatly appreciates the support of the ACT Government.

2019 Belconnen highlights include the sustained growth of our junior programs, CVL triumphs (CVL Champion Club), unprecedented ACT and National team representation and underpinning these, the inspiring dedication of the club's coaches. Belconnen also enjoys a position of current financial stability.

It has been fantastic to witness the growing numbers in the junior Belconnen programs (W & M). While playing numbers have been strong in the junior women's program in the last few years, this year saw an explosion of growth in the junior men's program that resulted in 3 additional teams entering Open League. A major feature of the year has been the progression of the junior players, with teams moving to higher level divisions from Autumn to Spring seasons and many players successfully making the transition to CVL. A great example being that two of the gold medal winning CVL Premier Men's team were players 15 years of age. Junior players also embraced the sand, with many players competing in the beach volleyball competitions before and/or after the indoor season, completing a great year round program.

The expansion of both junior programs pose training time/venue/coach questions for the club in 2020 and beyond. Answering those questions and planning for continued growth will be a key and immediate focus for the club.

Belconnen entered 21 teams in Open League across the Autumn and Spring seasons, an increase of 4 teams on last year. A successful year, with teams not only progressing to higher divisions from Autumn to Spring but also medalling in all but one division across both seasons (4G, 6S, 3B). A fantastic effort!

Fitting recognition of their great performances over the course of the season.

An impressive contingent of 54 junior Belconnen players were selected to represent the ACT at the Australian Junior Volleyball Championships across Beach and Indoor (8 players playing in both). This is an unprecedented number and fantastic acknowledgement of both the hard work of the players and the great work that the coaches are doing in the junior development space. A personal thanks to our committed group of coaches, Kim Magro, Phil Borgeaud, Carla Magro, Matisse Sipa Borgeaud, Russell Borgeaud, David Rochford, Caleb Hodgson, Matt Richards, Ben Hardy, Nic Borgeaud, Michael Watson and Matt Blowes. Belconnen players Holy Uren and Euan Rochford were awarded the Junior Player of the Year (female and male respectively) for performances across indoor, beach, club and representative volleyball - very well deserved!

At the senior level, 12 players were selected to Canberra Heat teams representing the ACT in the Australian Volleyball League Super League and Open Championship teams assisting the Super League Men to Silver and the Open Champs Women to Bronze. In addition, 8 players (Danusia Sipa Borgeaud, Lucy Ambagtsheer, James Weir, Jaiha Birkett, Holly Uren, Mackenzie Gibb, Euan Rochford and Roy Prosser) represented Australia in senior/ junior international competitions.

Belconnen finished the year with several teams competing in the Good Neighbour Tournament and this once again provided a fun, competitive and fitting end to our club volleyball year.

A challenging but highly successful year. ACT Dragons Volleyball Club (inc. University of Canberra Volleyball Club) endured a year of challenges due to limited availability of training venues across north Canberra. Our Open and Recreational League numbers dropped in the Autumn season due to this inability to train. Capital Volleyball League achievements reduced in 2019, although remaining competitive the late start to training and various disruptions encountered led to reduced performance. Dragons fielded teams in all Open League competitions securing successes.

Away from the court the Club continued to focus on stability financially and secured several minor partnerships. The pursuit of opportunities with schools and community engagements (e.g. Gungahlin Sports Gala) provided information around the needs of potential participants and how they may engage with the sport of Volleyball.

The lack of a "home venue" is costing us dearly; losing players due to training instability for all members, and an inability to promote activities of the Volleyball Club to the community.

The Men's Program suffered being unable to secure an ongoing coach; whilst those whom filled this role did a solid job, the churn led to the teams underperforming throughout the season. Nam Pham and Andrew Naef continued with the Women's Program, taking up the extra challenge of a UC team participating in UniSports Division 2 and subsequently Division 1 competitions. This activity builds on the player pathways within the club; many of the players in the UniSport program went on to win the Bronze medal at the National Club Championship.

The Club boasts a strong representation of players in VACT Recreational competitions; the next step to assist the Club is to have the players identify Dragons as their home club. In addition, Dragons teams or members participated in Volleyball events across the region and beyond including Cootamundra, Albury, Melbourne, Wollongong, Sydney, Penrith, Gold Coast and Brisbane. Traditional club awards allocated to volunteers whom contribute their time to help our club continued. Coach of the Year Nam Pham, whose efforts included leading teams to gold medals at UniSports and continuing to build an extensive ACT based player program. Dragon Heart, is someone who represents the values and enthusiasm for volleyball our club takes pride in, this year the recipient was Andrew Naef who has links to high school, college, University, club and National competitive teams; bringing home gold medals with each representative team.

Looking to 2020 ACT Dragons will continue to advocate for indoor training facilities; expand our schools programs taking in several schools in North Canberra and Gungahlin; continue with our Light Volley program seeking to increase participation and we will introduce a junior league, again seeking to build on the participation base for volleyball in Canberra.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Statement of Significant Policies

This financial report has been prepared on the basis that the association is not a reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial reports. This financial report is therefore a special purpose financial report that has been prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Association Incorporation Act (ACT) 1991 of the ACT and to meet the needs of the Committee and members.

This financial report has been prepared in accordance with the significant accounting policies disclosed below, which the Committee has determined are appropriate to meet the needs of Volleyball ACT and members. Such accounting policies are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated.

This financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs unless otherwise stated in the notes and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets. The accounting policies that have been adopted in the preparation of this report are as follows:

1.1 Fixed Assets – Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment assets are carried at cost (being the initial purchase or development price of the asset) less, where applicable, any subsequent and accumulated depreciation.

Depreciation is calculated on a straight line or diminishing value basis over the estimated useful life of property, plant and equipment. The depreciation method and useful life of assets is reviewed regularly to ensure they are still appropriate.

Increases in the carrying amount arising from revaluation of property, plant and equipment are credited to a revaluation reserve in equity. Decreases that offset previous increases of the same asset are charged against fair value reserves directly in equity. All other decreases are charged to the profit and loss.

1.2. Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the association's llability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee benefits have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

1.3. Cash on Hand and at Bank

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, demand deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less and bank overdrafts.

1.4. Trade and Other Receivables

Trade receivables and other receivables are recognised at the nominal transaction value, without taking into account the time value of money, less any provision for impairment. Trade receivables are based on normal credit terms and do not bear interest.

1.5. Supplier and Other Payables

Trade creditors and other payables are recognised at the nominal transaction value without taking into account the time value of money. Accounts payable are obligations on the basis of normal credit terms and do not bear interest.

1.6. Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Grant revenue is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt, if conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

Sales revenue is recognised at the point of sale. Amounts disclosed are net of returns and discounts. Other revenue and income is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

All income is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

1.7 Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST receivable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the balance sheet.

1.8. Income Tax

The Association is exempt for income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.
